Climate Action Plan for the Eagle County Community Stakeholders' Meeting Notes September 18, 2017 Walking Mountains Science Center

This is the third of four stakeholder group meetings scheduled for 2017. Three meetings were originally schedule but it was determined that a fourth was needed in lieu of the planned community open house.

Stakeholders' Updates

Town of Minturn

- Partners in Energy technical assistance program
- 2nd stakeholder meeting coming up
- Xcel energy Solar Connect Program

Eagle County—Transportation

- Metric based reports coming out this year
- Next step to meet with government boards in the community
- 1st quarter 2018 goal to roll into report findings into transportation sector working group
- New fleet services manager to involve in the process; to develop a committee within Eagle County and standardize vehicles
- Search for new County manager is on

Town of Avon

- Plastic Bag ban passed 1st reading
 - \circ 2nd reading in a week
 - Includes bags from Walmart
- Working on phasing in polystyrene ban to roll out in April
- Considering purchasing an EPS compactor
- Established first bike share

Town of Vail

- Working on the new Sustainability Strategic Plan for the town
 - Working to connect with Eco Products to supply products for distribution to vendors, focusing on event producers and vendors
- End of 2017 adding new partnership with EnergySmart CO to reduce community residential and small-medium business CO2 emissions
- Reporting- expanding reporting to get more data and resources
 - Also working to refine vehicle counting

- VW \$\$ for EV stations, looking into Electric powered buses
- Sole Power 45% increase in participation during summer 2017

Eagle County—Public Health & Environment

- Wants to support climate action strategies that reduce emissions, but also those that increase health and well-being and keep the community engaged
- Interested in looking at strategies that don't restrict certain populations from acting on climate change; spreading out the efforts and effects

East West Destination Hospitality

- Colorado Environmental Leadership Program Six properties recognized through the program
- Focusing on tracking and reducing GHGs via the Actively Green program
- Wren at Vail property replaced water heaters with EnergyStar rated new equipment
 - In five years, they've reduced carbon footprint by 10% and saved \$80,000

Vail Honeywagon

- State approved compost facility proposal
- Working with town of Avon on polystyrene ban and to get the recycling stream cleaner
- Suggests upgrading to a single stream MRF
- Working with A1 Organics to better understand how to streamline and handle event waste
- Compost is for sale—imported from A1 Organics for now
- Working toward getting their compost certified and for sale

Vail Resorts

- Late July announced zero footprint
 - o Zero net emission by 2030
 - Zero waste to landfill by 2030
 - Zero net operating impact to forests and habitat
 - Expansion at ski resorts would be offset in National Forest or elsewhere
- Developing energy capital projects plan across resorts
 - o Much to go toward more efficient snowmaking
- Reporting for 2018 with GRI standards
- Desire to be community partners in this this work

Eagle County—EcoTransit & Trails

- County board of commissioners looking at E-Bike regulations for the county
- Eagle trail project update

Eagle River Youth Coalition & WECMRD

- New executive director
- Revamping office for more videoconferencing and telecommuting

Colorado Mountain College

- Discussions about incorporating solar or some alternative energy into Edwards campus
- Academic conference in sustainability for CMC Edwards host in April
- Speaker from Standing Rock Water Protectors to speak at CMC

RA Nelson

- More interest in LEED certified projects recently
 - 2 custom homes built to the LEED certification
- Continuing Actively Green certification
- In house composting approved
- On site waste audits planned
- Looking to divert construction and demolition waste

Energy Solutions

• Recently attended Actively Green training

Vail Health

• Capital facility master plan is main focus

ERWSD

- Silver Level CO Environmental Leadership Program Award
- Almost Actively Green certified
 - Sustainable product purchasing is a hurdle to overcome
- Purchased several EVs and installed charging station this year
- Incorporating community solar array at biosolids site would require strong partnerships and financial support due to many other capital projects in the pipeline

EnergySmart CO

- As weather gets colder, working to make homes more efficient on the residential side
- Continuing education and training with local realtors on Home Energy Score etc.
- Goals is to attain 25% energy improvements in 25% homes in Eagle county
 - At 7% of homes currently
- Looking at growing the program at WMSC; working with contractor base and more staff
- New loan program from CO Energy Office
 - Renew Program- allows homeowners who don't have funds upfront to make efficiency improvements
 - Contractors can access
- Energy Efficiency Day Oct 5th outreach planned for newspaper

Basalt (Represented by CORE)

- Focusing on energy efficiency in Town of Basalt buildings
- Working on more EVs and grants for charging stations

• 2015 IECC Energy Code adopted for Basalt

Walking Mountains Science Center- Sustainability & Stewardship Programs

- 31 zero waste events- 30,000 lbs diverted to recycling and composting (~ 75% diversion rate)
- Education and outreach at recycling drop sites 6 days/week from mid-June to end of October
- Working with businesses through Actively Green
- Working Town of Vail for Nov 15 America Recycles Day event
- 6th year of the Sustainable Community Film Series main focus this year is climate change connections

Holy Cross Energy

- New Chevy Bolt (230 mile range)
- Think Efficiency Grant gave away \$300,000 this year
 - Parking garage lights in TOV and Eagle County and School District changing over to LEDs
- Passive solar livestock tank "group buy"
 - Reduces ranchers' cost by 50%
- Town of Eagle Chamber event Thursday night offering \$300,000 business makeover raffle
- Strategic meeting of board recently; pending updates

Vail Valley Foundation

- Actively Green efforts now spread across 5 staff members—much more inclusive
- Offering staff incentives for sustainable commuting
- Strengthening the sustainability culture of the internal organization
- Incorporating more waste diversion at events—good start GoPro Mountain games 2017

Town of Eagle

- Adopted resolution of support for the Climate Action Plan
- Council is considering signing on to Compact of CO Communities
- Working to build a staff climate action/sustainability group
- Council isn't totally supportive; fears added costs to construction, some denialism
- Eagle River Park thinking about solar thermal for showers, etc.

Eagle County – Sustainable Communities Department

- New Sustainable Communities department
 - Focused on climate action plan implementation meeting with other directors in a few weeks to see how we can move forward from a policy standpoint
 - Potentially update building codes for commercial and residential
- Internal environmental policy
 - Water efficiency automated, new this year
- Now including climate adaptation into the department
 - Wildfires is one of our biggest threats, so incorporating into community resiliency plan
- Attended Climate Action Campaign—Washington D.C. event
- Working to quantify carbon emissions and communicate progress

- 70,000 metric tons/year
- 350 metric tons to cut per year
- Looking at big buildings: justice center, jail, etc.
- 2 new EV free stations
 - Eagle Park & Ride
 - o Freedom Park

Updates from Sector Working Groups – What do you want to accomplish in the upcoming year? Include budget/fiscal updates

Residential Buildings Sector Working Group

- Looking for strategic ways to make a biggest impact and grow programs
- Adding a staff member to ESC at WMSC
- Targeting new communities/neighborhoods: Eagle-Vail, Avon, Vail
- Energy Outreach CO, Home Energy Score
- Looking to expand and create a more cohesive and comprehensive residential sector group
 Add more builders, contractors, governments, nonprofits, etc.
- Town of Minturn and Xcel PIES Program
 - Working on marketing/shared resources to provide additional access to ESC program
 - Farmers Markets and events energy efficiency visibility
- Eagle working on sharing more of home energy score and broader adoption of building codes
- Construction product- zip panels, exterior wall sheeting
 - Good alternative, as there was a loophole to including insulation

Commercial Buildings Sector Working Group

- Challenges getting the word out and recruiting people to participate in sector group meetings
- Desire to include more private sector representatives
- Vail Valley lodging general managers meeting would be a good connection for this group
 - Potential December meeting; looking for guest speakers
 - Share Vail Sustainable Destination Initiative
- Lunch & Learns associated with commercial sector group
 - Desire to get more business community members to attend these
- Build the business case for those hard to reach people and managers
 - Engage VVP for this
- Next commercial building group meeting: establish the business case and share with GMs; make plan for December meeting
- Science of social norms--utilize and share how this will benefit hospitality industry
- Higher levels of Actively Green soon to be launched with focus on setting and accomplishing focused goals, beyond baseline monitoring and policy making
- Holy Cross Energy: up to \$30,000 per business available per year in rebates

Materials Management/Waste Diversion Sector Working Group

- Municipalities, haulers, organizations, and residents in this sector working group
- Looking to Eagle County, municipalities, towns, and state to fund new waste diversion projects

- Composting: one of our big goals to support Vail Honeywagon's new facility
- Subcommittee meetings topic: compostable cups and other event waste
- Regional Study Work Eagle County Landfill
 - Waste audit recently conducted
 - o 1st since 2009
 - Dec 1st results will be available
- State of CO Diversion Goals
 - State has 19% diversion rate
 - Eagle County's is 17%
 - CAP Goal: 30% by 2030
 - State goal: 26% by 2026 and 36% by 2036
- Consider the CDPHE mini-grant: \$25,000 (up to)
 - Streamlined process
 - Open to towns, cities, county, schools, businesses
 - Focused on better infrastructure for waste management and diversion
 - Resources also, ex. funding for education
- 300 tons of trash/day dumped into our landfill
- Need more clarifying info on dual stream/single stream recycling
- Challenge points: shared housing, HOAs, Spanish speaking communities
- Consider applying for grant through the CAP group to establish this infrastructure in HOAs, hard to reach communities, etc.
- Jesse Masten, (Eagle County) provided a lunch & learn for ERWSD; consider doing this for large businesses to educate employees
- Quarterly MRF tours are offered by WMSC, business tours, Spanish speaking tours?
- Vail Honeywagon- Styrofoam issue

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- Looking at styrofoam condensers for the community
- 1 ton of recycling cuts GHG emissions by 1 ton; share this statistic
- Zero waste education- plenty of opportunity within events
 - Consider working on an Eagle County waste diversion plan for the Eagle County landfill and MRF o Smaller group: Shawn, Melissa, Jesse, Adam
- Transportation of waste and recycling to Denver isn't helping with GHG emissions
 - Consider this into revamping MRF and 2018 strategic actions

Transportation & Mobility Sector Working Group

- State measures vehicle miles traveled year to year accurately
- Need more direct correlation between vehicle miles traveled and GHGs
- ECO Transit study/report underway, will include comparisons with municipalities, cities, etc
- New Avon Bikeshare, conversations about growing bike share throughout the valley
- Need integrated transit system with multimodal transportation plan
- Conference call with Zagster bike share this Thursday 4 pm Adam Palmer is the contact

Education and Outreach Working Group

- Goal launch county-wide campaign to support CAP initiatives—emphasis on social norms and behavior change, participation in GHG reducing programs and activities
- Celebrate successes of stakeholders, calendar of messages within the campaign
- Will start with survey, then develop brand and message for digital & print media campaign
- Estimated budget: \$95,000 for 2018
- Vail Symposium interested in partnering with Walking Mountains Science Center to educate on Climate Change, they will assign someone to join the education and outreach working group
- Kim Langmaid attended Climate Education summit at Redford Center in Sundance, UT
 - Focused on climate education and outreach NSF grant recipient's work from past 7 years and scaling it out to local communities across the country
 - Met with Compact of CO Communities coordinator- Dan Kreeger

Summary of Recommendations from Collaborative Structure Ad-Hoc Working Group

- This group met twice since last stakeholders' meeting with the purpose to develop recommendations for a stronger collaborative structure for the stakeholders' group moving forward
- From the first meeting a document was created that covers what all of the local government stakeholders are currently doing related to climate action, and what the potential goals and benefits of a participating in a more formal collaborative structure would be.
- From the second meeting is was determined the recommended structure would be a continuation of the current stakeholders' group formalized through a Memorandum of Understanding and suggested annual membership fees. The formal collaborative would contract with a local non-profit (Walking Mountains Science Center for 2018) for project management/partnership services. The proposed budget for these services during 2018 is \$85,000.
- Draft MOU was provided to the stakeholders' in advance of this meeting and discussion follows:
- Currently proposed structure: MOU that binds all entities to working toward the CAP goals
 - All stakeholders would sign
 - Form an advisory hub to govern the collaborative
- Project management responsibilities are outlined, maintain efficiency, accountability, track budgeting (WMSC as fiscal agent), etc.
- In addition would be an education and outreach campaign coordinated by the sector working group and implemented by WMSC staff. The campaign would:
 - Engage community in GHG reduction activities/projects
 - Celebrate successes of the stakeholders, share stories of success publically
 - Begin with a community survey, develop a brand, create calendar of activities, implement comprehensive digital and print advertising campaign, measure success
 - Proposed budget for 2018 education and outreach campaign is \$95,000
- The collaborative structure committee recommended not forming a new special district energy authority at this time but that it could be an option for the future
- Recommendation for the annual collaborative membership fee structure to be based on annual GHG emissions

- If the collaborative wanted FT technical commercial buildings coach/engineer it would be an estimated additional \$100,000 annually, could be staff member or contractor
- Suggestion to include more private business stakeholders and hospitality businesses in the collaborative since they create the most GHG emissions and so they can contribute
- Need a mechanism that outlines what an organization is expected to contribute that is meaningful and acceptable
- Maybe take a donor model where stakeholders can choose contribution amount
 - Provide list of recommended level of contributions based on type of entity, emissions, energy use, budget, # employees
- Private business is motivated by competition: how do we take advantage of this?
 - o Government, municipal entity that pushes this forward: should we still have this?
 - Consider creating a subgroup composed of just private businesses
- Look into USDA grants; WMSC fundraising staff already spending time on behalf of this effort researching and applying for grants

MOU Recommendations, Feedback

- Consider revising language to be more vague/open; participation, staff time, contributions rather than set financial amount
 - Frame in the most inclusive possible way
 - Remove language of GHGs
- Many entities may not have capacity right now to measure and monitor GHGs
- Difficult for voting entities to commit: Town Councils, etc. since these are depending on community resident opinion
- More clearly define the benefits of annual membership fees for stakeholders
- Maybe break down MOU into individual goals that can move more quickly
- Discussion of the added value of the collaborative:
 - A community resource and clearinghouse of expertise and information
 - \circ $\,$ Already proven helpful for the Town of Avon and Town of Minturn
- Include consistent, streamlined data reporting for collaborative members
- Include annual report of outcomes and successes
- Provide clear talking points about what this will bring to the individual stakeholders' organizations and entities
- The collaborative approach removes silos, it works across sectors, creates efficiencies and partnerships
 - Encourages integrating climate action/GHG reduction goals and strategies into stakeholders' regular operations
 - Provides strong foundation for involvement and shared resources
- Need to build in time for stakeholders to adopt the MOU and then have a photo-op signature event in December

Action Step: In one month the stakeholders will be provided with: revised MOU, outline of benefits to participating in the climate action collaborative, suggested annual membership fee structure
