## **Global Effects of Climate Change**

While the majority of the world's carbon emissions come from a handful of wealthy countries, the adverse effects they have on the environment do not discriminate. In fact, climate change disproportionately impacts nations and people that have limited responsibility for the issue. In addition, compounding social issues that make populations in these countries vulnerable make them even more susceptible to having their lives negatively impacted by climate change.

- **Flooding:** Climate change has caused irregular severe flooding in many areas, which leads to many issues such as destruction of infrastructure, disruption of agriculture, and impassable roadways.
- **Drought:** Prolonged drought has put a significant strain on water resources which has several cumulative negative impacts, especially in regions without running water. Similar to flooding, this also has a big impact on farming, which supports the livelihoods of people across the globe.
- Compounding Social Effects: These climate issues have a bigger, more tangible impact on
  countries in the global south compared to those in the global north because of compounding
  social factors. Widespread poverty, lack of government services, reliance on subsistence
  agriculture, gendered social disparities, and lack of quality healthcare are just a few of many
  factors that make these regions and the vulnerable communities within them bear the burden of
  climate change more than the countries causing it.
